Understanding Globalization


- Economic Globalization is a fact, not a choice, but:

Why are Public-Private Partnerships Important?

- Growing interdependency and complexity development requires inputs and action by multiple actors
- Global economy / global awareness: stakeholder groups
- Shared responsibility, new roles, not governments getting off the hook
- A stable political, economic and social environment = a good investment and business environment

 - Dialogue
- Shared objectives (stake in the solution)
 - Partnerships
- Roles/contributions: not only money, but different resources (skills, expertise, management, creativity, etc)


