This final phase of the project will entail the development of a framework which will guide the transition to sustainable development in the minerals and mining sector in the region. Integration will also include a commitment to the process by the key stakeholders in the region.


Substance:

 - Task 3: Testing for Sustainability: How can mining activities be assessed or tested to ensure that their contribution to sustainability is positive; what criteria must be met?
- Practical final output that
 - cuts across and integrates issues of concern
 - builds on and supplements the work of others
 - is do-able within available time frame
 - has practical implication on the ground
 - is dependent on a collaborative process for effective development
