Partnerships for development are spreading like wildfire - in rhetoric if not in reality. This report examines a set of partnerships in forestry - those between companies

and communities - to see whether there is any substance beyond the hype. Some 57 examples in 23 countries are reviewed - from informal arrangements and social responsibility efforts to outgrower schemes and joint ventures. The report draws out lessons from experience - and outlines a set of principles, success factors, and next steps for developing partnerships that deliver better returns to both sides. These steps centre on getting governance frameworks right, developing brokering roles, and raising both the equity stakes and bargaining power of communities.

But this focus is being replaced by awareness that pluralist, adaptive management of biological resources needs biodiversity assessments able to express and communicate multiple values of biodiversity. This review looks at some of the assessment tools on offer, and some examples of actual practice, to identify how biodiversity assessments do - and how they could - integrate the different values that people attach to biological variety and variability.

In 1996 IIED initiated a multi-country, collaborative research project entitled Policies that Work for Sustainable Agriculture and Regenerated Rural Economies (PTW). The PTW project aimed to identify policies and policy processes that support sustainable agriculture and rural regeneration. It examined a cross-section of case studies across a range of agroecological and socioeconomic environments, and commissioned a number of 'Think Pieces' to make the connections between local policy and

transnational economic, trade and business institutions. The research started by identifying 'islands of success' of sustainable agriculture and then observing the different forces, power dynamics, policies and institutions that impacted on those successes. This report draws on the various findings to build up a picture of the policy environment for sustainable agriculture at the levels of local community, local government, national government, the private sector, and global institutions. It makes recommendations for each of these levels. This is the summary report; there are 11 other country and theme studies also available.

The book is a practical complement to a recent Resource Book on Sustainable Development Strategies, compiled by IIED and published by the OECD and UNDP (2002) which provides guidance on how to develop, assess and implement and implement such strategies.
