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

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#### Wagging the dragon's tail: emerging practices in participatory poverty reduction in China (PLA 62)

China's social transformation over the last 30 years has been dramatic ones. Fundamental changes are taking place in the relationship between the state and citizens. While in the past rural citizens were seen as passive recipients of target focused top-down programmes, official development planning in China now emphasises 'peoplecentred' development. Participatory approaches are playing a significant role in this transformation.

This issue reflects on emerging practices in participatory poverty reduction in China, and draws on case studies from a number of projects, including the Poor Rural Communities Development Project (PRCDP). It includes other articles of relevance, as well as resources and tips for trainers.

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
